Get Ahold of To get in contact with someone.


Get Along To have a good relationship.

Get It Over With

To complete a tedious task.

Get On

To start or continue something.

"I **got drop off** at school by my dad today."

"I have *gotten* into the university of my dreams!!."

"I hate leg day but let's **get it over with**." "I have to **get on** reviewing these legal documents."



Get Off

To escape punishment.

Get Out Of

To avoid responsibility.

Get Over

To recover from a bad situation.

Get Pick Up

To be taken by someone.

"I **got off** with a warning last time I was speeding."

"My sister always pretends to do homework to *get* out of cleaning."

"It took him a while to **get over** his ex-girlfriend." "I'm *getting pick up* by my dad this afternoon."
