Take After

To resemble a family member in appearance.

Take Apart

To disassemble.

Take Away

To remove.
To learn from information.

Take Back

To return or reclaim possession.

“She **takes after** her mother.”

“To fix a cellphone, you need to **take it apart**.”

“My son started crying when I **took away** the tablet.”

“After the fight, I had to apologize and **take back** what I said.”

Take Care Of

To provide for.
To deal with a problem.

Take Down

To eliminate.
To record in writing.

Take For

To perceive.

Take In

To give shelter.
To understand clearly.

“Love is **taking care of** each other.”

“He tackle his opponent **taking him down** and winning the fight.”

“People **take me for** a fool sometimes.”

“Europe has **taken in** a lot of refugees from the war.”

Take Off

To depart or leave.
To remove.
To go up fast.

Take On

To begin to do something.
To compete.

Take Out

To remove something from somewhere.

Take Over

To take control.

Meaning

“Her career is really **taking off**, she just got a raise.”

“This year she **took on** doing crossfit.”

“Please **take out** your notebooks.”

“The company **take over** did not go smooth.”

Take Through

To tell someone how something happen or is done.

Take To

To start doing something often.

Take Up

To became interested.
To occupy time.

Take Upon

To take responsibility.

“She **took** me **through** all the store workings.”

“I have **taken to** reading once a day.”

“She **took up** hiking as a hobby.”

“I **took it upon** myself to pick up my niece after school.”
